NIRVANA DAY

Nirvana Day or Nehan E is held in commemoration of Sakyamuni's Parinirvana, the culmination of eighty years of life, forty-five of which were dedicated to the spreading of the Buddha Dharma. The Sanskrit term Nirvana literally means "a blowing out as of a flame," and suggests the extinction of worldly passions and illusions.

Meaning of Nirvana Day

Nirvana Day, which comes on February 15, is one of the major Buddhist observances. The Sanskrit term "Nirvana" literally means "extinction, the extinction of the worldly illusions and passions." Wherever the extinction of illusions and passions is being achieved, there will be a calm and peaceful Nirvana, but the term which applies to this particular day means the death of the Buddha Sakyamuni.

Since the Buddha had attained his Enlightenment on this earth, he was a living Buddha and his Buddhahood would never die; but as the Buddha appeared from Dharma (Truth) onto this earth in the form of man in order to save man, his manhood had been a subject of earthly restrictions. He passed away at the age of 80 and entered into Mahaparinirvana or the absolute free state of Enlightenment. Nirvana Day in short, therefore, is the Memorial Day of Sakyamuni Buddha, the great founder of Buddhism.

Life and Death

On the full-moon day of February, knowing that his end was near, the Buddha came to Kusinagara, located about 100 miles from Benares. He had his bedding spread with his head toward the north between the twin Sala trees and he lay upon it facing the west. After giving his last instructions to his disciples, he entered into the fourth meditation and passed away.

No teacher was so serious about the problems of life and death as the Buddha. After years of study and meditation he came to this conclusion: "People think life and death occur in two different times and are two separate things. This is the reason some of them enjoy living and lament death while others seek death, being disgusted with living. Life and death are fundamentally simultaneous; life and death occur at the same time. A man lives in his mind after mind and dies in his mind after mind. The process of life and process of death always go together. Therefore, if he clings to life and death, both become an essence of his self. If he transcends from life and death, both become non-essence of his self. You should find your eternity in Buddhahood lifting yourself above the realm of life and death."

On February 13th, we will have Nirvana day and Dana day Service. Please come and let us think about our Precious and Unrepeatable life thru the teachings of the Buddha.

NAMO AMIDA BUTSU AND HAPPY NEW YEAR!

In this New Year, please let me express my warmest Aloha and Best Wishes to you for a harmonious, peaceful and reflective New Year filled with the Joy of the Dharma!

As we reflect (including self-reflect) on what is happening around the world

including our own nation, there is room for dire concern as aggression, violence, hate, inequality, disrespect, suspicion and mistrust erupt. At times, it may seem all too overwhelming. However, let us not lose hope. May we avail ourselves to the Wisdom of Enlightenment by letting it guide us and may Buddha's Compassion inspire us. Our Jodo Shinshu Teachings share that the Bodhisattva Dharmakara/Amida Buddha gives hope to the spiritually lost foolish being/bonbu by promising the attainment of Enlightenment through the Buddha's Unconditional Compassion by saying "Entrust yourself to me calling my Name, Namu Amida Butsu." Out of the Joy and Gratitude of True Entrusting for being unconditionally accepted without judgment emerges a deep lament about this imperfect I and an aspiration to live a more Dharma-centered life. In one of his Letters, Shinran Shonin states,

"There was a time when for each of you when you knew nothing of Amida's Vow and did not say the Name of Amida Buddha, but now, guided by the compassionate means of Sakyamuni and Amida, you have begun to hear the Vow. Formerly you were drunk with the wine of ignorance and had a liking only for the three poisons of greed, anger, and folly, but since you have begun to hear the Buddha's Vow you have gradually rejected the three poisons, and come to prefer at all times the medicine of Amida Buddha." (*Lamp for the Latter Ages, Letter 20*)



Further, says the late Rev. Jitsuen Kakehashi, "The 'turning of the heart' means forsaking the human-centered way of thinking and placing the teaching of the Tathagata at the center of our thought. Being saved means that with the Dharma-centered values, a new view of life is established in ourselves." "In our daily life, we are liable to be dictated to by our self-centered thoughts, but in the mind of nembutsu practitioners who are saddened and pained by this reality, there is a recurring transformation in which, with the heart and mind of the Tathagata's great wisdom and great compassion, we come to look back at our own thoughts and behaviors. When we look at the world with an ordinary human mind, it is distinctly divided into things we love and things we hate, but with the mind of the Tathagata, we are made to know that everyone is equally the Tathagata's indispensably important child. From that standpoint, we realize that we are all brothers and sisters and fellow human beings. Then slowly but steadily, we come to reflect on our self-centered thoughts, reject our blind passions and make efforts to see things and live our lives in a way that can be approved by the Tathagata." (*From "Hearing the Buddha's Call, The Life, Works and Words of Shinran*).

In this New Year, may the manifestations of True Entrusting such as "the benefit of having great joy in our hearts, the benefit of being aware of Amida's benevolence and of responding in gratitude to his virtue, and the benefit of constantly practicing great compassion" become more evident in our daily lives. As Jodo Shin Buddhists, let us respond to Amida Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion by reciting the Nembutsu and encourage each other to live a life centered on the Dharma including sharing our Awareness, Joy and Gratitude of the Buddha's Great Wisdom and Compassion with others. Truly as Shinran Shonin said, "May there be peace in the world, and may the Buddha's Teaching spread!" Once again, Happy New Year to one and all!

AFFIRMATION RITES CEREMONY (KIE-SHIKI)

DATE: MARCH 10, 2017

TIME: 7:00 PM

PLACE: MILILANI HONGWANJI MISSION

AFFIRMATION RITES

THE MEANING OF THE AFFIRMATION RITES BECOMES CLEAR IF WE LOOK INTO THE ORIGINAL NAME, "KIE-SHIKI". KIE MEANS TO SEEK REFUGE, AND IN BUDDHISM, WE MEAN TO SEEK REFUGE IN THE THREE TREASURES OF THE BUDDHA, DHARMA, AND SANGHA. THE OTHER PART SHIKI MEANS RITUAL. THEREFORE, WITH THESE MEANINGS IN MIND, THE TERM "AFFIRMATION RITES" WAS ADOPTED.

AFFIRMATION RITES IS OFFICIATED BY THE BISHOP OF HONPA HONGWANJI MISSION OF HAWAI'I. IT IS A RITUAL THAT GIVES THE RECIPIENT A DEFINITE AWARENESS THAT HE/SHE IS BECOMING A FOLLOWER OF THE BUDDHA'S TEACHINGS AND A MEMBER OF THE HONGWANJI. DURING THE RITES, EACH RECIPIENT WILL RECEIVE HIS/HER OWN HOMOYO (DHARMA BUDDHIST NAME) FROM THE BISHOP.

THERE IS NO LIMIT OF AGE. HOWEVER, IF THE ASPIRANT IS BELOW 20 YEARS OF AGE, HIS/HER PARENT OR GUARDIAN WILL BE ASKED TO SIGN ON THE OFFICIAL RECORD.

IT IS HOPED THAT THROUGH THIS RITUAL ONE WOULD GAIN CONVICTION IN HIS/HER RELIGION AND THAT IT WOULD BE A DEFINITE START INTO A LIFE OF A BUDDHIST.

THE APPLICATION FEE FOR THE AFFIRMATION RITES IS \$50. IF YOU WISH TO RECEIVE THE AFFIRMATION RITES, PLEASE COMPLETE THE APPLICATION FORM AND SEND IT TO THE FOLLOWING ADDRESS WITH YOUR APPLICATION FEE PAYABLE TO "MILILANI HONGWANJI MISSION" BY FEBRUARY 1, 2017. PLEASE WRITE "AFFIRMATION RITES" IN THE FIELD OF YOUR CHECK. IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS, PLEASE FEEL FREE TO CONTACT US.

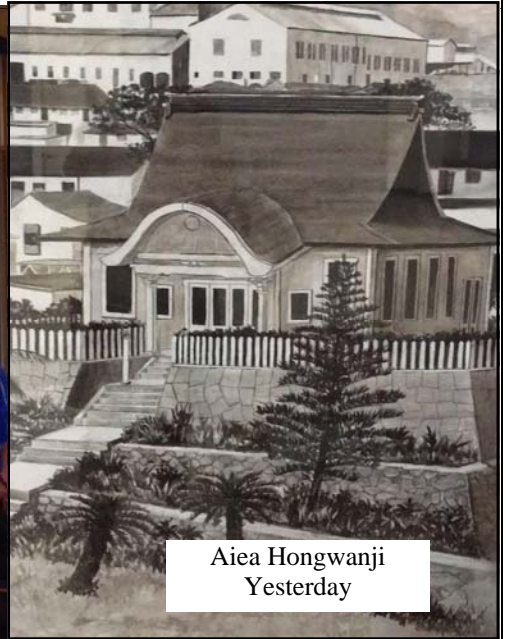

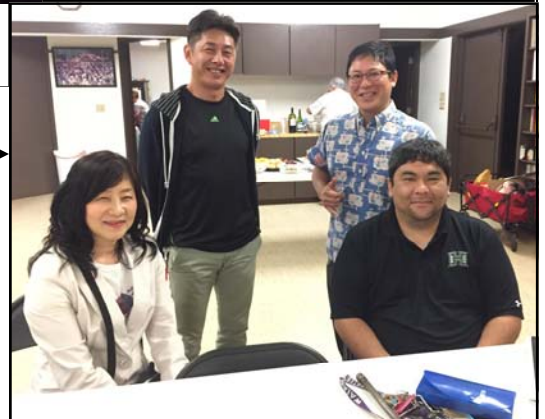

Resolution 016-03
GREEN HONGWANJI INITIATIVE
(State Lay Association)
APPROVED AS AMENDED

WHEREAS, the teachings of the Buddha guides us to act in compassion and wisdom;

WHEREAS, humanity has abused the environment in which we live today;

WHEREAS, our Sangha needs leadership and education on how to live in harmony and sustainability with our precious planet;

WHEREAS, other churches and organizations have already developed programs to embrace environmental awareness and sustainability;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the 104th Legislative Assembly approve a program, the "Green Hongwanji Initiative", to educate, set goals and develop an action plan to help temples and members live in ecological harmony within our communities, State and planet. This program would be led by a Kyodan committee charged with initial implementation by the 2017 Legislative Assembly; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution, upon its approval, be directed by said Legislative Assembly.

The above resolution was passed at Giseikai last year. The "Green" is for safeguarding our Environment. We are One World. What we do affects us all eventually.

One of the first steps in reaching a Green Hongwanji that has been suggested at many temples and by the BWA is for members to bring their own "recycleable" cups to functions to cut down on all the disposable (especially foam cups) thrown away and bulking up our trash bins. The Aiea Hongwanji Preschool has already switched to recycleable plates and cups and flatware for its noon-time meals. Of course, they have an automatic dishwasher. The Aiea Hongwanji Hosha group and the BWA on Thursdays use coffee cups and plates for its lunches, which are then hand washed and stored away for the next use. Many young and not-so-young people already have HydroFlasks and other sports drink containers, which (gasp) are recycleable !

Some temples are even suggesting that members to bring their own chopsticks. I bought a pair of plastic chopsticks in a cute container at Marukai, intending to use it for my meals outside of my home. Unfortunately, the first time I used it, I forgot it on the plate and I think it got thrown away. So now I have the cute container without the cute chopsticks. But I am going to try again.

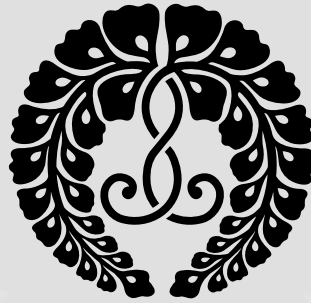
