
Minister's Message

Rev. Toshiyuki Umitani delivered one of the best Memorial Sermons in many years (in my opinion) at the opening service. 

BISHOP ERIC MATSUMOTO, 16th Bishop of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, was confirmed for a third term. The Bishop Selection Committee, after requesting for a waiver to the two term (8 year) limit, submitted its selection of Bishop Eric Matsumoto for the position of Bishop for his third term. Whereupon, the delegates of the 107th Legislative Assembly unanimously confirmed Bishop Eric Matsumoto as the Bishop of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii for another 4 years.

Bishop Eric Matsumoto took office as the Bishop in March 2011 and served two terms (March 2011 – February 2015 and March 2015 – February 2019). His third term will be from March 2019 to February 2023.

GISEIKAI MESSAGE FROM THE JODO SHINSHU HONGWANJI-HA GOVERNOR GENERAL BISHOP CHIKO IWAGAMI.

On the occasion of the 107th *Giseikai* of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, I humbly extend my appreciation to you the ministers and sangha representatives from throughout the state of Hawaii for gathering here. I would also like to express my heartfelt gratitude to you all for your continuing efforts in propagating Jodo Shinshu and maintaining the temples within your respective districts.

With Hawaii Kyodan marking its 130th anniversary this year, I wish you even more prosperous years ahead

and would also like to extend my respect to our forebears for their efforts and endurance of handing down the Dharma to us until today.

At Hongwanji, on the first day of the annual Goshoki Hoonko this year, the “Message on the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin’s Birth and the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching” *goshosoku* proclamation was presented, announcing the series of joint commemorative services set to be observed in 2023. At the closing of the autumn service last year, Monshu Ohtani Kojun introduced Our Pledge in his dharma message. The pledge is a four-clause motto, which is a summary of his dharma message given on October 1, 2016, “A Way of Living as a Nembutsu Follower.” It would be nice if the pledge could be introduced at various temple gatherings.

In closing, it is my hope that the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii will continue to prosper and that many fruitful results will arise from this annual meeting.




